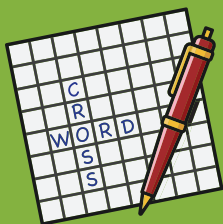

RECIPE

You don't have to be Welsh to enjoy these cakes, simply irresistible with their unique tender and melt-in-your-mouth texture, enriched with sweet currants. They're incredibly easy to make and better eaten still warm and dusted in sugar.

Ingredients

- 250g flour
- 60g caster sugar (plus extra for sprinkling)
- ½ teaspoon spices (cinnamon and nutmeg)
- ½ teaspoon baking powder
- ½ teaspoon salt
- ¼ teaspoon salt
- 80g butter, cut into small pieces
- extra butter for cooking
- 50g dried currants
- 1 egg, beaten
- 2 tablespoons milk

Method

1. Combine in a bowl flour, sugar, spices, baking powder, salt.
2. With your fingers mix in the butter until the mixture resembles coarse crumbs.
3. Add the currants and the beaten egg.
4. Add a little milk as needed until you have a soft dough.
5. Wrap the dough and refrigerate for 30 minutes.
6. Roll the dough out onto a lightly floured work surface about ½ cm thick.
7. Cut out rounds about 5cm in diameter and gather up any trimmings, knead together and roll out again to cut more rounds.
8. Lightly butter a flat iron pan and place over medium heat.
9. Cook on each side about 3 minutes until they are golden brown and have risen slightly.
10. Remove the Welsh cakes from the pan and let them cool.
11. Delicious eaten while a little warm with butter and jam, or just sprinkled with sugar.

LITTLE KNOWN FACTS ABOUT COCA-COLA

The earlier Coca-Cola glass bottle designers were inspired by "an illustration of a cocoa bean" that the researchers found when they went to the library to find some ideas. But there's no cocoa in the soda: Coke was made with ingredients from the coca plant, not the cocoa plant!

At the beginning of the Nineteenth century, Coca-Cola was advertised as "the Great National Temperance beverage" for "temperance people", and was sold as an alternative to alcohol.

The 1980s Coca-Cola became the first soft drink to be consumed in space. In 1985, astronauts drank Coke aboard the Space Shuttle *Challenger* from special Coca-Cola space cans, according to the company.

In 1985, in the hope of revitalising the brand, the Coca-Cola Company introduced the "New Coke", a new formula that was to replace the original Coca Cola. Consumers however weren't happy with it, and after just 79 days the company brought back "Coca-Cola Classic". This disastrous attempt has been defined as "the biggest marketing blunder of all time".

In 2007, Joya Williams, 42, former Coca-Cola secretary, received an eight-year prison sentence for trying to sell Coke's secrets to PepsiCo for at least \$1.5 million. Williams allegedly tried to send "confidential documents and samples of products" from Coke to rival Pepsi, but it seems that Pepsi went to the FBI rather than accepting the trade secrets.

With an average daily consumption of 2.2 litres of Coca-Cola, some indigenous regions of Chiapas have the highest rates of Coca-Cola consumption in Mexico, possibly in the world.

There are just two countries in the world where Coca-Cola cannot be bought or sold since the company doesn't officially operate there. They are Cuba and North Korea, that are under US trade embargoes (Cuba since 1962 and North Korea since 1950).

Coke fans don't just sip it over ice: Cola chicken has become a popular dish and another favourite is Coca-Cola cake, a fudgy chocolate cake enriched with the sweet taste of Coke.

There are no other logos with the Coca-Cola "font" because, in 1893, the company registered the trademark for "Spencerian script" with the U.S. Patent Office. So Coca Cola trademarks and Coca Cola logos may only be used in conjunction with goods produced by Coca Cola or with the express prior approval of Coca Cola.

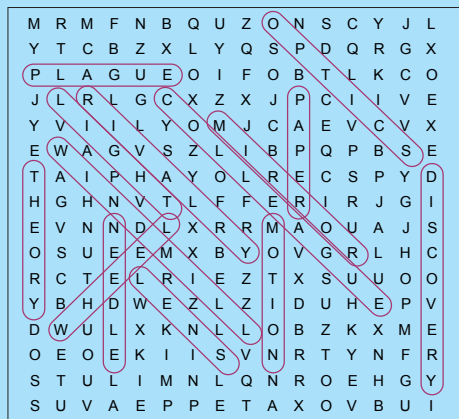

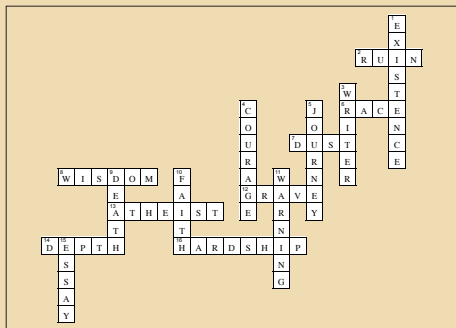

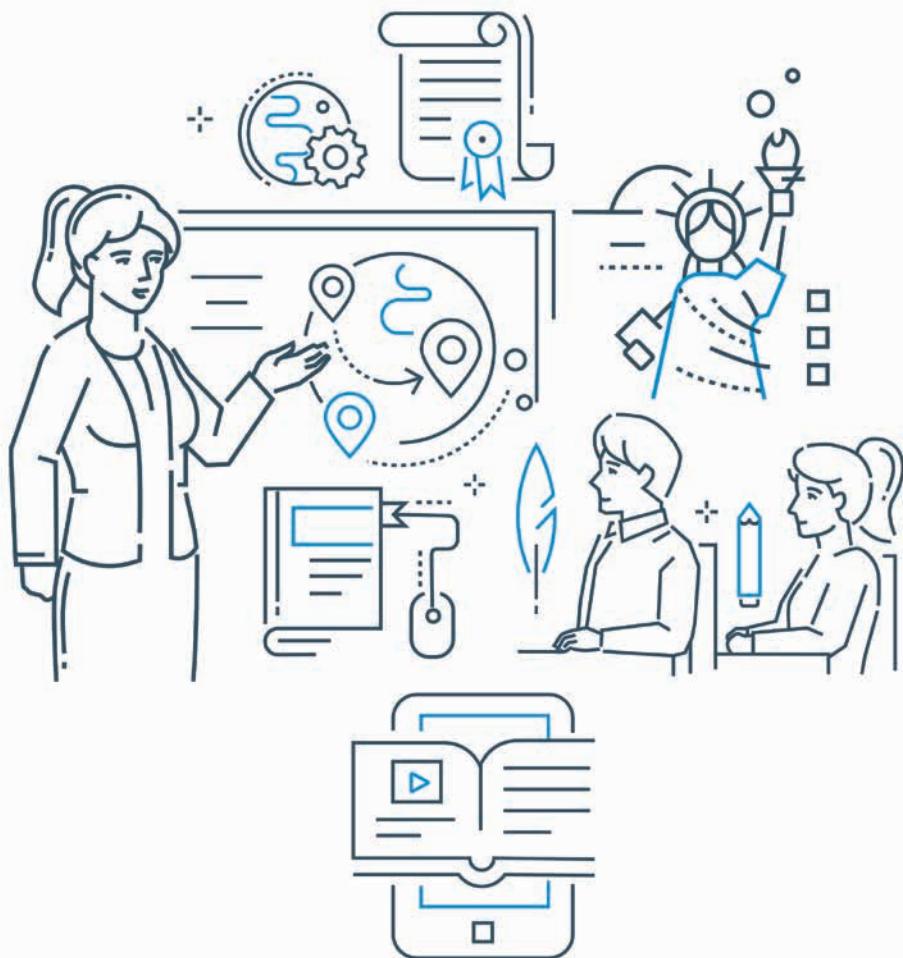
