SOMETHING MORE ABOUT THE JERSEY ROYALS

- It all started in the late 1800s when a Jersey farmer called Hugh de la Haye noticed that a potato he had bought had fifteen "eyes" (from which new plants sprout). He showed it to his friends, they cut it into pieces and planted them to see what happened. The following spring one of the resulting crops produced tiny kidney shaped potatoes. If they had eaten the entire crop, Jersey Royals wouldn't exist at all; instead they planted them again the next season and, as a result, the Jersey Royal is now the island's most famous export product.
- Jersey Royals account for more than half of Jersey's income from all agricultural products.
- The isle of Jersey measures just 120 square kilometres and Jersey Royal potato fields make up approximately **one third of the island** more or less the equivalent of 5,500 football pitches.
- Lersey soil is light and well-drained, and many farmers still employ some of the most traditional methods of farming such as using seaweed harvesting from Jersey beaches as a **natural fertiliser** (which is known locally as "vraic"). The practice of using vraic on the land **dates back to the 12th century**. Jersey has some of the largest tidal ranges in the world, and the strong movement of the sea deposits large quantities of vraic on the shore.
- Most of the crop is planted by hand. In fact the fields on the slopes near the coast, known as "côtils", are so steep that almost all **the work is done by hand**.

During the height of the season **1,100 tonnes a day** of potatoes will be transported across the United Kingdom (99 per cent of production is exported to the UK).

- ♦ In May, at the peak of production, up to 1,500 tonnes are exported daily, with pickers working **twelve-hour shifts**. The potatoes are harvested between the months of April and June.
- One farm worker can lift enough potatoes in one day to feed **280 people**.





RECIPE

5.4

Jersey Royal potatoes, with their distinctive nutty and earthy flavour, need very gentle cooking. The best way to serve them? The simplest way! And, if Jersey Royals aren't available, other types of new potatoes will work beautifully in this dish.

Jersey Royals Ingredients . 700g Jersey Royal potatoes

- - 3 small shallots 150g salted butter
 - · 2 tablespoons freshly chopped · 2 tablespoons freshly chopped chives or mint

 - pepper

• Wash the potatoes in a sink of cold running water to remove the soil. Be very gentle because you want Method

to try to keep the skin intact. Simply rub each potato


Fill a large saucepan with cold water, add the potatoes and a generous pinch of salt. Turn the heat on, bring to the boil then reduce

the heat and let the potatoes simmer until they are tender, about 10-15 Meanwhile prepare the herb butter: put the butter (at room temperature) in a bowl, add the shallots finely chopped (you could use red onions but

shallots are sweeter and milder). Add a mixture of parsley and chives (or mint if you prefer) finely chopped. Season with pepper (avoid adding salt if you're using salted butter). Mash together with a fork and put in the fridge Test the potatoes with the point of a knife. Drain well and allow to dry. Put some oil in a pan and put it on a stove. When the oil is hot, add the

potatoes and fry until lightly crisp on the outside (just about a minute), stirring with a spoon. Add the herb butter and let it melt. Serve hot.



WHAT'S YOUR CARBON FOOTPRINT?

Our carbon footprint measures the total amount of GreenHouse Gases (GHGs) released into the atmosphere as a result of any activity, whether it's the making and supply of a product, or individual actions. A person's carbon footprint depends on their lifestyle. Usually people living in wealthier countries have lifestyles that contribute the most emissions: that's why they have the largest carbon footprints.

The average annual footprint for a person living in the US is eighteen tonnes GHGs. The highest emissions result from flying, road transport and from what people eat.

The average annual footprint for a person living in India is 1.7 tonnes GHGs. Even though India has a large population, the carbon footprint per person is rather small: that's because fewer people fly, less energy is used in homes and also because many individuals in India prefer vegetarian diets.

FLYING - 465 KG GHGs per 10-hour flight

Taking a plane is one of the largest emitting activities a person can undertake. A return flight from London to Johannesburg generates more carbon emissions than the average person in Ghana produces in a whole year.

PHONES - 3.4 KG GHGs per hour

This footprint includes emissions from phones' production and delivery. Besides, charging smartphones is associated with the use of electricity that could have been generated burning fossil fuels.

MEAT SANDWICH - 1.44 KG GHGs

The impact of a meat sandwich includes harvesting crops and rearing animals. In addition to packaging, transport and refrigeration.

WATCHING TV - 0.16 KG GHGs per 6.5 hours

Even though watching TV has a relatively modest carbon footprint, it still is an activity extremely popular and the use of streaming video is growing exponentially around the world.


