

Some people poach them in honey-sweetened water, but here we have gone for the unsweetened version, New York style. Ingredients • 1 % cups warm water 3 ½ cups flour 4 tablespoons white sugar 1 ½ teaspoon salt • 2 tablespoons vegetable oil • (Optional toppings: 2 tablespoons poppy seeds or sesame seeds. Or I tablespoon coarse salt.) • Combine water, flour, sugar, salt, vegetable oil and yeast. Mix and stir. (You may need to add additional tablespoons of water.) On a floured work surface, knead the dough for about 10-15 minutes Un a rioured work surrace, knead me dougn for about 10-10 minutes until it is smooth and elastic. Or you can use an electric mixer fitted with a Method Transfer dough to a lightly oiled bowl, cover it with a damp dish towel, and to be a lightly oiled bowl. transfer uougn to a fightly offer nowi, cover it with a uamp usit tower, an let rise in a warm place for 2 hours, until the dough has doubled in size. Punch the dough down, and let it rest for another IO minutes. Shape each piece into a round and press your finger into the center to make a hole: form a ring large enough to allow room for the dough to expand during poaching and baking.
