

**RECIPE** 

5.1



This speedy fruit crumble is a stunning dessert and classic comfort food at its best, especially when outside it's cold and the kitchen oven fills the house with an irresistible smell.

## **Ingredients**

- 500 g fruit (you can use any fruit or combination of fruit according to the season)
- · 75 g sugar
- · 50 g cold butter, chopped
- · 100 g flour
- · 50 g raw sugar

## Method

- ◆ Preheat the oven to 180 °C.
- Slice the fruit directly into the pie dish.
   Mix together the fruit and the sugar.
- In a bowl, using your fingertips, rub the butter into the flour until the mixture has a breadcrumb-like texture. Do not overwork it: the result should be a bit lumpy
- Add in the raw sugar and sprinkle the crumb mixture over the fruit until completely covered.
- Bake for 35-45 minutes or until golden brown, and the fruit is tender.
   Leave to cool for 5 minutes.
- You can serve the crumble topped with ice cream or whipped cream.
- Tip: To add an extra element of flavour and texture, oats, almonds, nuts or cinnamon can be added to the crumble mix.
