

The song's provocative lyrics, criticising the monarchy and conventional norms of the time, became a symbol of counterculture and a youth rebellion anthem. Despite controversy and censorship attempts (BBC banned the song from airplay), God Save the Queen defined the punk movement, highlighting the band's rebellious spirit and influencing subsequent generations of musicians and fans. Scotch eggs, with a crispy crumb, sausage meat stuffing and boiled egg centre, are really perfect for a picnic, a party or a light dinner. lust serve them on lettuce, sliced tomato and mustard for garnish. Packaged Scotch eggs are commonly available in British supermarkets but why not try this delicious and easy to follow beginner recipe!

Scotch Eggs **Ingredients**

4 large eggs

- · I pound pork sausage meat
- · 2 tablespoons flour
- I large egg, beaten
- · I cup dried bread crumbs, seasoned
- · I quart oil for deep frying

Method

- Place eggs in a saucepan and cover with water. Boil, cool, and peel them.
- Divide the sausage into four equal parts. Flatten the meat and make a patty to surround each hard-cooked egg, rolling between your hands to shape.
- Very lightly flour the outer sausage layer.
- Beat raw egg in a small bowl. Coat the balls with beaten egg to cover evenly, then roll in the bread crumbs. Shake off any excess.
- Heat oil in a deep-fryer until a cube of bread dropped into the oil turns brown in I minute.
- Carefully deep-fry prepared eggs until golden brown, making sure each side is well cooked, about 5 minutes.






