





WIMBLEDON

RECIPE

Pimm's and Wimbledon are synonymous with British summer traditions. Here's the recipe for this quintessential English summertime cocktail, a refreshing drink featuring Pimm's No. 1 liqueur mixed with lemonade, fresh fruits. and mint.

Pimm's is a gin-based liqueur with a deep dark brown colour, infused with a unique blend of herbs, spices and caramelized orange kept secret by its creators. In the 1840s, James Pimm, an oyster bar owner in London, used to craft his own liqueurs numbering rather than naming them. Over time, six distinct Pimm's recipes were developed and bottled for sale. Among these, Pimm's No. 1 emerged as the most popular and enduring choice.

Pimm's

cocktail

Ingredients

- ice cubes
- 50ml Pimm's No. 1
- 150ml lemonade
- strawberries, cut into quarters
- cucumber slices or peel
- orange slice
- lemon slice
- mint leaves

Method


- Fill a tall glass with ice cubes.
- Add Pimm's No. 1 to the glass.
- Pour in lemonade.
- Stir gently to combine the ingredients.
- Add slices of fresh fruits (strawberries, cucumber, orange, lemon) to the glass.
- Garnish with a sprig of fresh mint.
- For an extra touch, you can add a slice of cucumber or lemon as a garnish on the rim of the glass.
- (There are two popular variations, adding ginger ale or champagne.)
