

Mac and cheese, short for "macaroni and cheese", is a classic comfort food very popular in the United States, where it is considered a staple dish. It's basically macaroni pasta combined with a rich and creamy cheese sauce. This recipe is super easy to follow and the ultimate in cheesy deliciousness.

Ingredients

- · 250g elbow macaroni pasta
- 30g butter
- 30g flour
- 500ml milk
- 150g grated cheddar cheese
- 50g grated Parmesan cheese
- salt and ground black pepper to taste
- breadcrumbs (optional, for topping)

Method

- Boil the pasta in a large pot of salted water until "al dente" (firm to the bite).
- Drain and set aside.
- In a medium saucepan, melt butter over medium heat.
- Add flour and whisk for about 2 minutes.
- Gradually add milk, whisking continuously until the sauce is nice and thick, about 5-7 minutes.
- Remove from the heat and stir in the grated cheeses.
- Season with salt and pepper to taste.
- Add the cooked macaroni and stir until the pasta is evenly coated.
- You can serve it as is or you can bake it, following the instructions below.
- Heat oven to 180 °C.
- Transfer the mac and cheese to a baking dish.
- Sprinkle breadcrumbs over the top for a crispy topping.
- Bake in the preheated oven for about 20-30 minutes, or until the top is golden brown and the sauce is bubbling.
- ◆ Let the mac and cheese cool for a few minutes before serving.
