

## **IDIOM**

## "Every cloud has a silver lining"

▶ This popular weather-related idiom means that every difficult or sad situation has a comforting or more hopeful aspect, even though it may not be immediately apparent. The phrase has been traced to a line from a performance piece by 15th-century poet, historian and civil servant John Milton. His festive play, entitled *Comus*, was in the form of a 'masque', destined to entertain the court at Ludlow Castle in Shropshire in 1634. Comus is a debauched character who encounters a Lady lost in the woods and attempts to persuade her to "drink from his magical cup" (a euphemism for sex.) The Lady refuses and is eventually rescued by her brothers. During the masque "in honour of chastity" Milton asked, in the old English of the time, "Was I deceived or did a sable cloud Turn forth her silver lining on the night?" suggesting an unforeseen benefit may emerge from a negative scenario.






